PUBLIC LIBRARY ISSUES PANEL: PRESENTATIONS ON 26 SEPT. AND 3 OCT.

Students will present panels on Week 6, 26 September and Week 7, 3 October. Six panels maximum.

*The purpose of this assignment is to share details, cases, questions, and resources related to current issues that public librarians are facing.

- Develop as a team of 3-4 students a continuing education panel for librarians on a topic of current interest.
- Each team will present a 40-55 minute panel presentation to the class and.
- Each student should also submit a one-page (double-sided) Handout to accompany their portion of the panel. They should include a bibliography of consulted sources.

AUDIENCE PROFILE HANDOUT

"The purpose of this assignment is to consider the wide audience that public libraries serve by selecting one audience segment and considering their needs and how public libraries do and might respond."

Your audience is your classmates. Teach us what you know about a specific audience that public libraries serve!

Each student should contribute to a large group discussion online on the topic of the audience(s) that public libraries serve. We must be mindful that any one person might not be associated with only one segment, especially over a lifetime. Consider, then, our intersectionality. Remember that any one individual may have different needs each time they reach out to the public library and the public library tries to anticipate their needs.

Share your original two-page (one page double-sided) Handout with the class. Add an unnumbered cover page to your document. Your bibliography will be a separate page at the end.

IMLS GRANT PRE-PROPOSAL

*The purpose of this assignment is to provide you with an opportunity to gain some experience in preparing a competitive grant proposal.

Task: You work in a public library and have decided to apply for an IMLS grant. Work by yourself or another student to prepare a two-page pre-proposal for an IMLS grant.

Step 3: Look at the sample pre-proposals for funded grants to public libraries.

Step 4: Decide to apply for a National Leadership Grant for Libraries or a grant through the Laura Bush 21st Century Librarian Program.

You may submit a Pre-Proposal for a Planning Grant or Forum Grant.

Your two-page Narrative should include:

- Statement of need
- Project design
- Diversity Plan
- Impact
- Budget Summary

Your budget might include these categories:

- Salaries and Wages (Permanent Staff)
- Salaries and Wages (Staff Hired for the Project)
- Fringe Benefits
- Consultant Services
- Travel (IMLS requires you to request \$4,000 in case they want you to attend a meeting.)
- Supplies and Materials
- Student Support (e.g., tuition)

IMLS GRANT PRE-PROPOSAL REVIEWING

*The purpose of this assignment is to provide you with an opportunity to gain some experience in serving on a review team for a funding agency.

*You will serve on a team. The goal for each team is to review IMLS Grant Pre-Proposals submitted by others of your classmates to make recommendations on which Pre-Proposals should be invited to submit full Grant Proposals.
